Three Main Career Paths ...

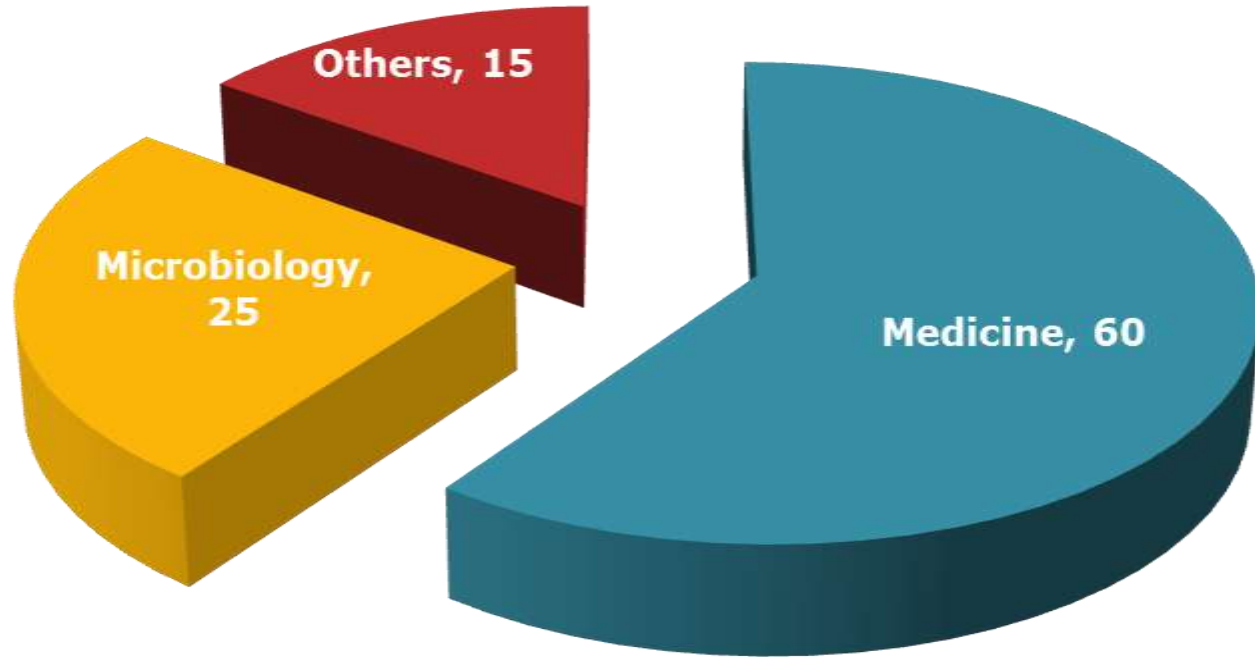


Skills, Knowledge, Ability

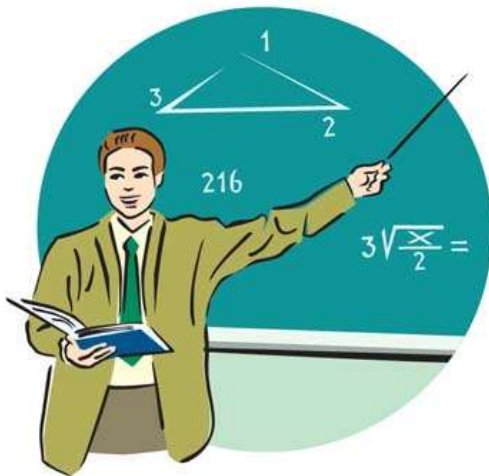


Choosing a Career

Rule#1: Choose a career that is something you really like to do.

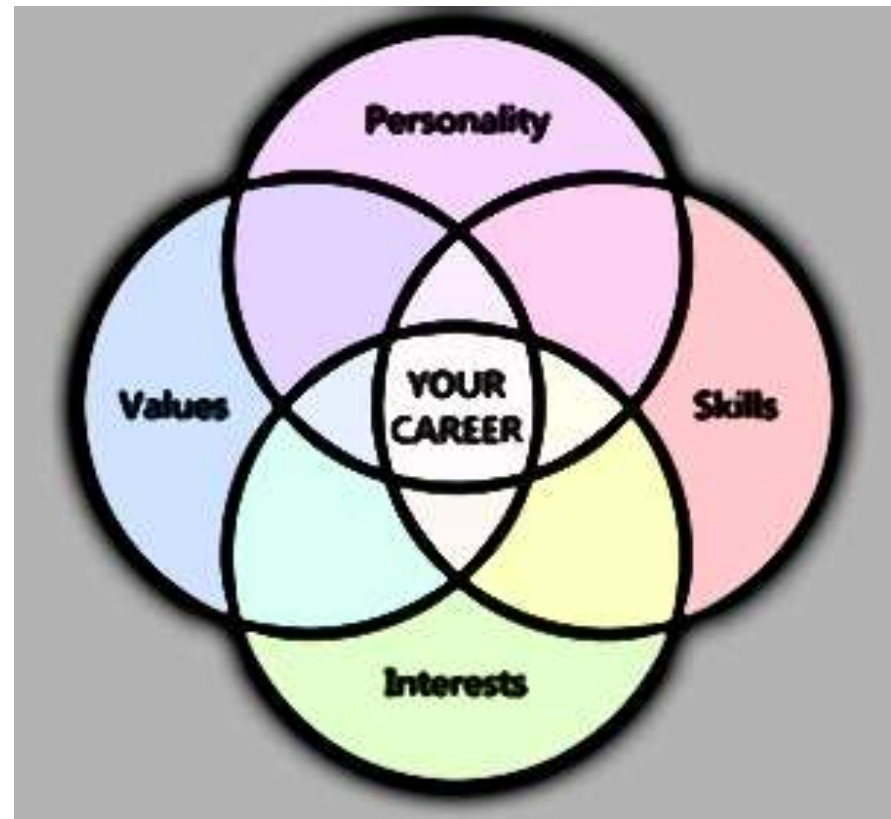
Rule#2: Do your research and choose prayerfully, carefully and thoughtfully.
